

Good progress to report this month on Carole's MGA and my V8. Tom has both cars right now. The V8 engine bay has been stripped of every nut, bolt, wire and engine. Tom will be stripping the paint and giving it a re-spray to renew and match the body. After the engine detail, I will install a new wiring harness and the brake system will get a rebuild top to bottom including all pipes, hoses, and cylinders. Then it'll be topped off with DOT 5 fluid.

At this time Carole's A does not look much like a car at all. The body is off the frame. Tom is going full speed on the body, which is now mostly stripped. There is little rust to deal with. The frame is a little more of an issue with rust repairs I made over 30 years ago. We had the frame baked at 800 degrees in a large oven to burn off most of the paint, then dipped. Now bare, I'm replacing all of the floor mounting channels, the battery boxes and cleaning up some of those old rust repairs from long ago. All of my welding should be done in a few days, and then on to the suspension, rear end seals, brake pipes and paint

on the frame. If the timing is right, it will be back on its wheels with the drive train installed, and back off to Tom to remount the body. It will also be fitted with a new 5 speed gearbox that I have ordered from England. All this A stuff is getting me fired up to start my 60 A (Right Hand Drive) Coupe. Who knows, maybe I will get two A's done to Skip's one! ©

Seven Types of English Surnames — Which One Is Yours?

any of us have surnames passed down to us from ancestors in <u>England</u>. Last names weren't widely used until after the Norman conquest in 1066, but as the country's population grew, people found it necessary to be more specific when they were talking about somebody else. Thus arose descriptions like Thomas the Baker, Norman son of Richard, Henry the Whitehead, Elizabeth of the Field, and Joan of York that, ultimately, led to many of our current surnames.14IVE ME ACCESS

There are perhaps 45,000 different English surnames, but most had their origins as one of these seven types.

Occupational

Occupational names identified people based on their job or position in society. Calling a man "Thomas Carpenter" indicated that he worked with wood for a living, while someone named Knight bore a sword. Other occupational names include Archer, Baker, Brewer, Butcher, Carter, Clark, Cooper, Cook, Dyer, Farmer, Faulkner, Fisher, Fuller, Gardener, Glover, Head, Hunt or Hunter, Judge, Mason, Page, Parker, Potter, Sawyer, Slater, Smith, Taylor, Thatcher, Turner, Weaver, Woodman, and Wright (or variations such as Cartwright and Wainwright) — and there are many more.

This kind of name also gave a clue about whom a servant worked for. Someone named Vickers might have been a servant to Mr. Vicker, and someone named Williams might either have served a William or been adopted by him.

From the obscure fact department: In medieval England, before the time of professional theater, craft guilds put on "mystery plays" ("mystery" meaning "miracle"), which told Bible stories and had a call-and-response style of singing. A participant's surname — such as King, Lord, Virgin, or Death — may have reflected his or her role, which some people played for life and passed down to their eldest son.

Describing a personal characteristic

Some names, often adjectives, were based on nicknames that described a person. They may have described a person's size (Short, Long, Little), coloring (Black, White, Green, or Red, which could have evolved into "Reed"), or another character trait (Stern, Strong, Swift). Someone named Peacock might have been considered vain.

From an English place name

A last name may have pointed to where a person was born, lived, worked, or owned land. It might be from the name of a house, farm, hamlet, town, or county. Some examples: Bedford, Burton, Hamilton, Hampshire, Sutton. Writer Jack London's stepfather may have hailed from London.

From the name of an estate

Those descended from landowners may have taken as their surname the name of their holdings, castle, manor, or estate, such as Ernle or Staunton. Windsor is a famous example — it was the surname George V adopted for the British royal family.

From a geographical feature of the landscape

Some examples are Bridge, Brooks, Bush, Camp, Fields, Forest, Greenwood, Grove, Hill, Knolles, Lake, Moore, Perry, Stone, Wold, Wood, and Woodruff. Author Margaret Atwood is probably descended from someone who lived "at the wood."

Patronymic, matronymic, or ancestral

Patronymic surnames (those that come from a male given name) include Benson ("the son of Ben"), Davis, Dawson, Evans, Harris, Harrison, Jackson, Jones (Welsh for John), Nicholson, Richardson, Robinson, Rogers, Simpson, Stephenson, Thompson, Watson, and Wilson.

Matronymic ones, surnames derived from a female given name, include Molson (from Moll, for Mary), Madison (from Maud), Emmott (from Emma), and Marriott (from Mary).

Scottish clan names make up one set of ancestral surnames. These include Armstrong, Cameron, Campbell, Crawford, Douglas, Forbes, Grant, Henderson, Hunter, MacDonald, and Stewart.

Signifying patronage

Some surnames honored a patron. Hickman was Hick's man (Hick being a nickname for Richard). Kilpatrick was a follower of Patrick.

Wondering whether your family name is English? Try plugging your surname into the Ancestry Last Names Meanings and Origins widget at www.ancestry.com/learn/facts. Type in the surname "Duffield," and you'll see it's English, a "habitational name from places in Derbyshire and East Yorkshire, so named from Old English Dufe 'dove' + feld 'open country."

Chevy Impala Gets Stolen in Idaho, Found in London

Chevrolet Impala goes missing. You don't know where it is, who took it, or if you'll ever see it again. Then, out of the blue, it surfaces... halfway around the world. It may sound like the plot to some farfetched crime drama, but it isn't. It just happened.

London's Metropolitan Police found this '68 Impala abandoned last month on the side of a road in the city's Sutton neighborhood. As can be clearly seen, the Chevy sustained some significant damage, but instead of finding the typical UK registration plate, police were shocked to find the Impala wore Idaho license plates.



So how does a Chevrolet from Idaho end up 4,800 miles away in London? That's the question of the day. Metropolitan Police were initially unable to find and get in contact with the Impala's actual owner in Idaho, prompting a multi-day countdown until the Chevy was either sold or scrapped. Thankfully, there's a happy ending to the story.

Idaho's 7 KTVB picked up the news on Tuesday, posting photos of the wrecked Impala on Facebook. The car's owner, Carol Cameron, later commented on the post and confirmed the car was hers by matching a photo of her Impala to the one in the impound lot, license plates included. Wrecked or not, Cameron noted that she's still bringing the car home.

Finn Fined \$60,000 for Speeding

veryone knows crime doesn't pay, but sometimes you have to pay big time for a small crime. A driver in Finland was recently fined \$60,000 for doing 64 mph in a 50 mph zone, The Sunday Times Reports.

The hefty levy for the 14 mph infraction was courtesy of Finland's income-based system, which uses a sliding scale based on the previous year's income of the ticketed individual. The logic being that typical fines aren't as much of a deterrent to the wealthy as they are to average folks.

The driver in this case, Reima Kuisla, owns race horses that compete around the world and had a

reported income in 2014 of around \$7 million. Afterward, he posted on <u>Facebook</u> that he's now considering leaving the country.


If he does, he may want to avoid Germany, Austria, France and Switzerland, which all employ a similar system. The last of those dished out a \$1 million ticket to a Swedish driver passing through the country at an equally impressive 180 mph.

The Ten Costliest Cars in the World

10. Porsche 918 Spyder

Price tag: \$850,000

With only 918 in production, this limited edition Porsche is also a hybrid. It has 4 modes: electric, hybrid, sport and race, letting you switch between them at will. Under the hood you'll find a 4.6 liter V8 engine with 608 horsepower alongside 2 electric motors that add another 279 horsepower to the package. This Spyder can drive for 12 miles on battery alone, when put in hybrid mode – its fuel consumption is the best in its class. Switch it to race mode and it goes from 0 to 60 in 2.6 seconds, peaking at 217 mph!!!



Price tag: \$1 million

The Hennessey Performance Engineering company took and modified the frame of a Lotus, giving it a 7 liter twin turbo V8 engine that produces 1,200 horsepower. It can go from 0 to 186 mph in 13.6 seconds with a top speed of 270 mph. Most amazingly, this beast weighs a mere 2,740 lbs! Incredible!!!

8. McLaren P1

Price tag: \$1.3 million

Built as a successor to the legendary McLaren F1, this hybrid comes with a 3.8 liter twin turbo V8 engine that unleashes 727 horsepower. Activate the Instant Power Assist System and the 2 electric motors jump into action, raising the output to 903 horsepower! The P1 can go from 0 to 60 in 2.8, with its top speed electronically limited to 217 mph. McLaren only produced 375 of these bad boys and all were sold within 2 months!







7. Pagani Huayra

Price tag: \$1.3 million

Huayra is named after the South-American god of winds, and rightly so. Produced by the Italian Pagani motor-sports company, it packs a 6 liter twin turbo V12 engine that launches the car from 0 to 60 in 3.2 seconds and peaks at 230 mph. It's also incredibly light, weighing only 2,980 lbs.



6. Ferrari LaFerrari

Price tag: \$1.4 million

This is the most expensive and powerful car ever built by Ferrari Motors! Known also as the F150, the LaFerrari's hybrid engine is a 6 liter V12 monster, accompanied by a "Kinetic Energy Recovery System" (Ferrari's fancy name for an electric engine), it produces 963 horsepower, goes from 0 to 60 in 3 seconds and reaches top speeds of 217 mph, all with the light weight of 2,760 lbs.!



5. Lamborghini Reventón

Price tag: \$1.6 million

The Reventón is a redesign of the Murciélago, using the frame and engine (a 6.5 liter V12 engine, producing 750 horsepower and going from 0 to 60 in 3.4 seconds and maxing out at 211 mph. the hefty price tag is due to only 27 Reventóns were ever produced, and 7 of those are on display and not meant to be sold.



4. Koeniggsegg One:1

Price tag: \$2 million

The fastest production car in the world according to the Guinness Book of Records, the One:1 has a verified top speed of 280 mph and it's 5 liter twin turbo V8 engine produces an insane amount of horsepower – 1,341, to be precise! This is also thanks to its light weight (only 3,000 lbs), achieved by reducing the weight of the monstrous engine through the use of aluminum block and carbon fiber manifold.



3. Bugatti Veyron Super Sport

Price tag: \$2.5 million

The previous holder of the Guinness Book of Records' title as the world's fastest production car, the Veyron can still reach speeds of up to 267.8 mph and goes from 0 to 60 in 2.4 seconds. Its unique engine is a 16-cylinder, quad turbo engine that produces 1,200 horsepower. It requires 4 fuel pumps to keep the engine working and 10 radiators to overcome the sheer amounts of heat this monster produces. There are only 40 Veyrons in the world, and only 5 of them can reach the actual top speed of 267.8 mph...



Price tag: \$3.4 million

Considered to be the most luxurious vehicle ever made, this Lebanese-produced car earns its title thanks to the 15-carat diamonds that line its headlights and the assortment of precious gems that can be incorporated in the interior design. Now, its hefty price tag doesn't only buy you gems you also get a 3.7 liter twin turbo flat 6 engine that can unleash 740 horsepower, accelerate from 0 to 60 in 2.8 seconds, reach a top speed of 240 mph, at only 3,040 lbs.



Price tag: \$4 million

There are only 4 Vevenos in existence. They were made to celebrate Lamborghini's 50th anniversary and are based on Aventador. It has a carbon-fiber body, making it super durable while keeping its weight at 3,300 lbs. The engine is a 6.5 liter V12 that cranks out 750 horsepower, launching you from 0 to 60 in 2.8 seconds and peaks at 220 mph.

Oh, and there were another 9 Vevenos made as a topless roadster, each of those sold for \$4.5 million!!!
