British Car Day in Toronto Ontario, Canada

If irst heard of British Car Day in Toronto, Ontario Canada many years ago. Our good friend and club member, Bill Hammond, formerly a Canadian, told me about it; said it was a huge car show. Bill's wife, Hazel's relatives, who live in Canada participated in this show with their MGs and Triumphs. Bill and I talked about going to this show but were both involved in the Concours d'Elegance at Carillon Park, which was always the same weekend and so did not get there before Bill's passing. This year, following a couple of years of planning and documenting what I did at the Concours, I was able to convince Dave Gribler to fill in for me, so I could travel to Canada for the car show. Thank you, Dave!

Day 1 Friday: Per the plan published in the Octagon News, several MG Car Club members met at the rest area just north of Columbus at 10:00am on Friday October 15th. My friend, Jim Cox and his wife Janice had driven their Triumph TR6 up from Louisville Kentucky on Thursday and stayed overnight in Springfield. They went to dinner with Linda and me at Ye Olde Trail Tavern in Yellow Springs that evening. We had received an email message from one of the Toronto show's organizers, indicating that we could be in the running for the Long-Distance award, but didn't think much about it. Friday morning, two Triumphs left Springfield, bound for Columbus to meet the rest of the group. We arrived at the rest area first, followed shortly by Dar Planeaux in his MGA, Carole Looft in her Yellow MGB and Terry Looft driving his white MGBGT V8. After introductions and a short break, we headed north to our rendezvous with my daughter, Elizabeth for lunch at Mavis Winkle's Irish Pub in Twinsburg, Ohio. After a nice lunch with Elizabeth, on her Birthday, we continued North for our overnight stay in Erie Pennsylvania. No mishaps; all the cars ran well. We found a Hoss's restaurant for dinner that evening. Some of you may recall that we dined at Hoss's several times on the Gettysburg trip for MG 2018 in June. It has a great salad bar and is reasonably priced. Before and after dinner, we gathered for our little parking lot party enjoying some beers conversation.

Day 2 Saturday: After enjoying the free breakfast at the Hampton Inn, (was it really free or did we really pay for it in our room charge, not sure?) we continued north to our crossing into Canada over the Peace Bridge at Buffalo New York. We encountered construction zones and watched our temperature gauges climb as we crept towards the bridge. We all made the crossing into Canada and proceeded to the Canadian Warplane Heritage museum that Terry knew about from an MG friend who lives nearby and is involved with the museum. We enjoyed looking at all the planes inside and then received a special treat watching a Lancaster bomber land and taxi. It rarely flies, and we just lucked out to be there that day to see it land. The bomber has four Rolls Royce V12 engines and is very loud. For a mere \$2,000 you can take a ride, which is why it rarely flies. After a very enjoyable visit to the museum, we headed to the hotel to join Carole, who passed on the museum and had gone on ahead to the hotel to check in. We were able to park our cars together in the parking lot for a photo op. Jim, Janice and I were taken to dinner that evening by Vic Johnson, a friend of ours who lives in Canada, while the others went to Mass and dinner elsewhere. Vic and I have a lot in common, as he also owns an MGB and a Triumph. His Triumph TR250 is still being restored and he had his very nice red chrome bumper MGB at the show. Vic bought a 5-speed transmission for his Triumph from Jim Cox as I also had done, which is how we all became acquainted. We all hung around the parking lot a while after returning and prepared our cars for the show. Anything that was not needed at the show went into the trailers or to our rooms.

Day 3 Sunday: We headed to the show shortly after 8:00am per instructions we had received. In leading our group to the park, I knew we were to go West on the QEW (Queen Elizabeth Way) and assumed we

would make a left turn onto the entrance ramp, which we did after a U-turn. Anyway, everyone followed except for Terry, who chose to follow a Mini, who surely must know a short cut? Well, he decided after a few miles that the driver of the Mini did not know where he was going and so turned around and made it to the park a short while after the rest of us. Entry to the show field was intentionally slow to hold down the dust on the gravel entry way. Entry was very well organized, and we quickly were directed to our respective class areas. We were early and noticed that there weren't many cars, but the show field quickly filled up and probably reached the show's estimate of 1,200 cars. It was a beautiful sight with 55 classes of British cars spread out over 10 to 15 acres in Bronte Provincial Park. There were a lot of unusual cars there, including Rileys, Reliants and lots of Lotuses. The first car I had owned was a 1959 Anglia and there were two on the show field. We all settled in, put the finishing touches on our cars, found coffee and each other in our respective class areas. Walking the large show field and voting took some time with a lunch break in the middle. There were lots of vendors there too. We found a place to sit in the shade when shortly after 2:00pm, they began handing out the awards. Jim and Janice were pleased and surprised to win, not only the Long-Distance Award, having driven their TR6 from Louisville, Kentucky; but also, the third-place award in their class. Terry and Carole got the secondplace award in the MGBGT and Rubber Bumper MGB classes respectively. Dar and I placed first in our classes, MGA & TR4. After returning to the hotel and freshening up, we all got into our cars to drive downtown in Oakville for dinner. Jim &Janice's TR6 would not start. It was not getting spark and after checking all the usual suspects, Jim happened to feel the coil and almost burned his hand it was so hot. And, I remember many years ago, one of our members, John Lucente saying, "It's never the coil." "Everyone always checks the coil, but it's never the coil!" Well, this time it was the coil. Honoring a Special Veteran for Veterans' Day

he British monarchy has a long tradition of military service, but there has only been one woman from the British royal family to ever serve in the Armed Forces, and she's the only remaining head of state to have served in World War II. If you haven't figured it out by now, I'm talking about Queen Elizabeth II.

When WWII reged in Europe, nearly everyone stood up to defend their homeland. Men, women, farmers, and businessmen did their duty alike. This includes then-Princess Elizabeth. Like her father, who served in WWI, she enlisted on her 18th birthday despite being in the line of succession for the throne and in spite of her father's reluctance.

After months of begging her father to let his heir pitch in, Elizabeth joined the Women's Auxiliary Territorial Service (ATS) as a Second Subaltern (from 1941 to 1949, the ATS used the ranks of second subaltern and subaltern, which were equivalent to second lieutenant and lieutenant respectively). The King ruled after long deliberations with his councillors that her training as a princess outweighed the nation's increasing manpower problems and that 'Betts' should not join any of the women's auxiliaries, nor work in a factory. But Betts had other ideas. It was not surprising that not long

afterward the Palace made a straight-face announcement that the King 'had been pleased to grant an honorary commission as second subaltern in the ATS to Her Royal Highness the Princess Elizabeth.'

Princess Elizabeth enrolled in the Women's Auxiliary Territorial Service (ATS), similar to the American Women's Army Corps, where many women actively served in highly valuable support roles. Responsibilities of the ATS included serving as radio operators, anti-aircraft gunners, spotlight operators, and, and the queen-to-be's specialty, mechanic and driver.

Once in the Auxiliary Territorial Service, Elizabeth learned how to change a wheel, deconstruct and rebuild engines, and drive ambulances and other vehicles. It wasn't a lavish position, but despite the grit and grime, she didn't just symbolically change a single tire and call herself a mechanic. She took her duties very seriously, taking great pride in her work. *Collier's Magazine* wrote at the time

that "one of her major joys was to get dirt under her nails and grease stains on her hands."

However, being a princess still had its perks. She returned to the palace each night to sleep. On VE Day, then-Princess Elizabeth slipped away with her sister to cheer with the crowds. The war was finally over and no one recognized the Princesses as they walked through the crowd incognito.

Less than a decade later, Princess Elizabeth would be crowned the Queen of England. Her independent spirit has endured to this day, as she never liked being chauffeured around when she could drive herself.
