MGA Coupe Restoration Update

Progress was made this month when the masked men of the MG Car Club Southwestern Ohio Centre resumed work on restoring the 1959 MGA Coupe that was donated to the British Transportation Museum.

Dave Gribler, Ron Ramer and Mike Hirsch bent and installed the Brake lines and attached the wiring harness front to back. Rick Shields tried everything he could to get the brake drums installed on the front, only to learn that we had the wrong brake shoes. I had neglected to check the part number on the brakes shoes that were donated to the effort, assuming they were correct for the MGA. Turns out they were MGB brake shoes and they did not have a notch allowing them to fit over the adjusters. This was sorted, when Skip Peterson asked the question, "What is the part number for these brake shoes?" Oh well! The correct MGA brake shoes have arrived allowing us to complete assembly of the front brakes at our next work-day. Dave McCann and I completed installing the wooden floors. And, lesson learned, if we had it to do over; we would order the pre-cut floorboards. We bought a piece of exterior plywood for less than \$10 and cut the floorboards using the old ones as templates. It took some grinding and drilling to make them fit, but it's done! The Ed's, Hill and Wolf, continued refurbishing various parts offsite. Steve Powell cleaned and polished the yoke for the steering column and painted the spiral steering column cover. The reconditioned fuel pump is being shipped back to us by Tom Ball.

Continuing our efforts to stay safe from the coronavirus, we will be scheduling volunteers a few at a time as we progress towards achieving a running chassis.

Rare Stainless Steel Ford and Lincoln Cars Being Shined Up For Sale

esla soon will be sending its futuristic Cybertruck to take on the F-150 in the pickup segment, but you'll be able to buy three different stainless steel Fords before it does. The vehicles are not new; Ford and a company known today as Allegheny Technologies worked together in past collaborations to promote the metal.



The 1936 Ford Deluxe Sedan, 1960 Ford Thunderbird and 1967 Lincoln Continental Convertible were all manufactured with the Pittsburgh-based steel company's product on their existing assembly lines. Six Deluxe Sedans, two Thunderbirds and three Continentals were built. The cars were all used in the real



world to help promote and test the durability of the rustresistant material, and the bodies held up better than their conventional counterparts before they were finally parked.

Despite their success, stainless steel hasn't found common usage in car manufacturing because of its cost and the difficulty of shaping it with machine tooling. The latter is a large part of the reason why the Cybertruck and iconic Delorean DMC-12 feature boxy designs. Stainless steel is also hard to paint, which is why Tesla will be providing color options by offering vinyl wraps.

The cars are all currently owned by Allegheny Technologies and will be offered in September at the Worldwide Auctioneers Auburn, Ind., auction. The

company, which made a profit of over \$258 million last year, says it's selling them in the hopes that they'll end up in a collection or museum where they will be more widely appreciated. Worldwide hasn't issued an estimated price for the lot, but another one of the Deluxe Sedans received a high bid of \$550,000 at a Mecum Auctions event in 2010, which wasn't enough to meet the reserve price, according to Autoblog.





Editor's note – The Crawford Auto and Aviation Museum in Cleveland has a 60 Thunderbird and a 66 Lincoln Continental convertible in their collection. I seem to recall that the placard with them stated that these always were the last few cars made during the production year, as stamping the body parts in stainless steel distorted the moulds, making them unusable again.

History of the Drive-Thru:

The innovation that changed the way Americans eat

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ased on recent events, the drive-thru might be one of the most important inventions for the foodservice industry. While they've been around for a long time, drive-thrus are seeing a huge surge in usage during the coronavirus pandemic. After all, most restaurants across the

country still aren't allowed to offer indoor dining, and people looking to get out of the house for a bite to eat don't have to go much further than their car.

But while it seems that almost every fast-food restaurant has a drive-thru lane, there was a time when people actually had to — gasp — get out of their cars every time they wanted to order a burger and fries. The drive-thru has its origins tied to a chain of restaurants called the Pig Stand, which is



credited with opening the first drive-in restaurant in Texas in 1921, according to History.com. Customers would park and a carhop would serve burgers and fries directly to their cars. A Los Angeles location of Pig Stand eventually offered the option of bagging up meals for takeout starting in 1931, laying the foundation for what later became the drive-thru.

Red's Giant Hamburg in Missouri opened what is generally considered to be the first true drive-thru in 1947, Money.com reports. A year later, In-N Out Burger opened a drive-thru that used a state-of-the-art (at the time) two-way speaker box. Then, in 1951, Jack in the Box opened in San Diego as a drive-thru only restaurant, coinciding with the growing popularity of car culture in America.

The popularity of the drive-thru has since had a huge impact on the fast-food industry, and not just in how the parking lots were designed. Restaurants that wanted to cater to the car crowd began to focus on easy-to-eat foods like burgers and bone-free pieces of chicken. French fries also became popular, albeit without any messy toppings, per History.com.

But drive-thrus didn't just change how people ate — it affected the design of the automobile itself. Before drive-thrus, cars were rarely designed or manufactured with cup holders. By the 1980s, the feature was considered a must-have in every car.
