He bought his Harvest Gold MGB new in 1975. It was most likely not long after that, when he joined the MG Car Club Southwestern Ohio Centre.

Charley had fun driving his MGB to various British car events. Along with his daughter Kathy, he made several trips to Grand Rapids Michigan to attend University Motors summer parties. He and Kathy participated in the Route 66 Rally at the St. Louis MGB meet in 2003. That is where he was one of the "MG Nuts," posing for the photo. Bill Hammond had fake tattoos made up for the occasion, depicting a stylized octagon shaped nut with the wording "MG Nut."

Charley had his entourage with him at the MGB meet in French Lick Indiana in 2014. Most of his family was

there with him and some of us occasionally visited and enjoyed the shade of their push-up during those hot afternoons.



Charley thoroughly enjoyed our club visit last October as our fall tour came to his residence in Loveland. Charlie, his daughter Kathy, and his fellow residents had a good time visiting and looking at our MGs. It was a nice afternoon visit.

When Charley bought his new MGB, he did a couple of things to prolong its life. Like most Ohio residents did back then, if they bought a new car they intended to keep, they had it rust proofed. Charley did the same for his MGB, had it Zebarted. Therefore, he usually did not open the bonnet at car shows, exposing the black, rust proofed engine bay. It worked! His

We didn't know each other then, never met, neither of us owned an MG yet and did not know we would become friends many years later. Friends we did become though, and I will miss him, as we all will. It's hard to say goodbye to a friend like Charlie, so we'll just say 'Till we meet again.'

Automotive Old Wives Tales

Actually, maybe I should have called this Old Father's Tales, since most of us were taught to drive by our fathers. Whatever!!

Back in the 50s and 60s when most of us learned to drive, each of us certainly was given advice on how to be a safe driver and how to take care of our car. Before the advent of all the safety features on today's

cars, most of this advice probably made sense. Some didn't, even back then, and some are no longer relevant. But, some still make sense. Here's the list I came up with, with help from our club members and some friends to whom I reached out. Thanks for all the great ideas!!

- 1. Never leave your car in Park when you park it. If someone hits it, the transmission can be damaged. Leave it in Neutral and use the parking brake. True? I have no idea, and I've always put the car in Park.
- 2. Just as you shut off the engine, give it a little shot of gas. This will put extra gas in the carburetor and make it easier to start. True? Again I have no idea and I've never done it.
- 3. When you park your car, don't forget to close the little triangular vent window and latch it. True? Good advice in the 50s and 60s, but how many cars today have that "little triangular window?"
- 4. Make sure the gas station attendant checks your oil, coolant, and battery every time you buy gas. True? What is a "gas station attendant?"
- 5. Pump the gas pedal as you crank the engine. True? O.K. with our antique cars, but not needed on modern cars. The computer makes sure the engine gets the correct fuel/air mixture when starting, then brings it up to the proper idle speed. Keep your foot on the floor and off the gas pedal when starting.
- 6. Fill the gas tank in the morning when the gas will be colder, because it will be denser so you'll get more gas to the dollar. True? No way. Being stored in underground tanks, the gas will be the same temperature and density whenever you buy it.
- 7. Pump the brakes when slowing down or stopping on icy pavement. True? Again, O.K. for antique cars, but not for modern ones with anti-lock brakes. Anti-lock brakes automatically pump the brakes more precisely than a driver pumping them manually, so step on the brakes with firm, steady pressure and keep steering the car in the direction you want it to go. But, be aware that stopping distance may increase.
- 8. Keep a few bags of rock salt or kitty litter in the trunk in winter. It'll give you extra traction on ice by putting more weight on the drive wheels, and if you get stuck in the snow, throw some under the tires for better traction. True? Perhaps, if you drive one of the few modern cars that still has rear-wheel drive.
- 9. Park in a well-light area lest someone steals the hood ornament. True? I guess so, but I haven't seen a hood ornament in years. I guess someone's father back then didn't worry much about personal safety. But today, I'd worry about getting my catalytic converter stolen (Don't ask how I know...why do I feel an article about this coming on?).
- 10. Accelerate slowly when using the wipers because they'll slow down. True? Yes, for older cars whose wipers were powered by engine vacuum. As far as I know, wipers on modern cars are all electric now, but my 1950 MG TD has an electric motor to power the wipers. It's located on the top of the windscreen, right where the passenger's head would hit it if I make a panic stop. So much for a safe design.

- 11. Get the car out on the freeway every so often to burn all the carbon off the spark plugs. True? Maybe back then, but with fuel and air all computer-controlled now, spark plugs usually stay pretty clean until they eventually wear out.
- 12. Let the engine warm up on a cold morning before driving to get the oil flowing. True? With thicker oils back then, this might or might not have been true, depending on who gave the advice, but definitely not now. The experts claim that with modern engines using lighter-weight oil, it is best not to let a cold engine idle but to drive at moderate speed for the first mile or so.
- 13. Avoid short trips when the engine is cold or moisture will condense in the muffler, causing it to rust sooner. True? Read on. Probably true back then, when monster V-8 engines made of steel took a long tome to warm up, which meant the exhaust wasn't that hot at first. Thus, the muffler didn't heat up quickly either, so moisture from the exhaust could condense in the muffler. Add to that, mufflers were made of galvanized steel, and they eventually rusted through. Aluminum block engines on modern cars heat up faster, so the muffler also heats up faster. Factory mufflers on new cars today are made of stainless steel, which is much more rust resistant. However, most aftermarket mufflers still use galvanized steel, so you still may want to heed this one if you bought a cheap muffler-shop muffler.
- 14. When pulling out into traffic, look both ways, then look both ways again before proceeding. Good advice? I think so.
- 15. Every car has a blind spot, some bigger than others. Turn your head and look before changing lanes. And, if your car has a blind spot monitor, don't bet your life on it, or someone else's life. It's a tool for you to use, and it doesn't have the last say. You do. Great advice!!
- 16. Grip the steering wheel at the 10 and 2 o'clock positions and use the "hand-over-hand" method when steering. True? Not any more. With all new cars now having airbags, the safety experts say that placing your hands at the 9 and 3 o'clock positions, or lower, and using the "push-pull-slide method reduces your chance of being injured by your own hands in the event the airbags inflate.
- 17. Never assume other drivers are calm, rational, and polite. Still great advice if you ask me!
- 18. Always keep a few dollars in your wallet. True? Good advice, but maybe today it's more like \$20. Then again, who doesn't carry credit cards and what are the chances of finding a merchant who doesn't accept them?
- 19. Don't speed; you'll just waste gas and get to the next red light sooner. True? Probably, assuming the lights are sequenced. By obeying the speed limit, you just might make every light when it's green. Or, maybe not.
- 20. Make sure the clutch is all the way to the floor before moving the gear shift. True? Absolutely. I hate to think about what some of the gears on my MG TD look like.
- 21. Batteries put out less power on really cold mornings, so turn on the headlights for a few minutes to warm up the battery a bit. True? Maybe. Some people who live in the far north swear by it.
- 22. Pull over if you feel sleepy. True? Absolutely.
- 23. Be very careful if you smoke in the car. You can set the seat on fire. True? Yes, and it happened to a high-school friend of mine. After smelling burning fabric, he pulled into a fire

station. They slashed the seat open and emptied a fire extinguisher into it. I have no idea how he explained that to his parents, if there were any consequences, or if he got billed for refilling the fire extinguisher.

- 24. Never let your gas tank get below ¼. Actually, not bad advice. You may have to rush somewhere in an emergency and don't want to be running on fumes. Also, with the fuel pump being located inside the gas tank and surrounded by liquid, it helps keep the pump from overheating.
- 25. Don't try to outrun a police car or argue with an officer. We'll get you out of jail if you've done nothing wrong. True? Sure!!!
- 26. Don't drink and drive. True? Absolutely, then, now, and forever!!
- 27. And my favorite. Not exactly what I was looking for, but a great remembrance.

I grew up in a small Texas town of about 1250 people. My dad owned a feed store. My 17-year-old sister taught me to drive in our '49 Chevrolet truck with a floor stick shift. That was in 1952 when I was 12. I was soon delivering feed to customers in the evening in the truck. I got my license when I was 14 and got my commercial license when I was 16. I received no formal driving instruction until I took Drivers Ed in high school, although I already had a commercial driver's license. In a small rural town where everyone knows you, including the friendly police officer, they don't worry about a lot of the small details.

far others, Dar reports that Mary is up and walking. It's going to be a long summer for them."


