



Crash Detection with the Apple iPhone

ecently, my grand daughter was involved in a serious car accident with airbag deployment (no injuries, thanks to the air bag and her seat belt, but she was bruised and shaken up a bit). She said that the first thing she recalled was hearing her iPhone calling 911 all by itself. Not being an electronic gadgets techie (an Android phone being just fine for me), I'd never heard of this feature. Here's what I learned about this great feature that could save lives when seconds may matter.

Crash detection is available on Apple iPhone 14 and later models, and on Apple Watch Series 8. There is no similar function on Android phones, except for Google Pixel phones, but I suspect it will be coming to others.

Crash detection takes multiple environmental factors into account, four that I could find, and there may be more. G-force is the obvious one, but you wouldn't want 911 called every time you dropped your phone. In fact, it may not even be the main one, as your phone may be somewhat insolated from the high deceleration forces of a crash if tucked in a pocket or purse. While a person in even a severe crash may experience 100 "g's", the iPhone's tiny accelerometer can withstand and measure up to 256. BTW – "g"

experiencing 1 g vertical and zero g horizontal. When you accelerate, you may feel like you're being pushed into your seat. You are, and you're pulling more than zero g's. Enough technical stuff.

refers to the acceleration of gravity. When sitting still or moving at a constant speed, your body is

Next is watching for a very rapid speed change using its GPS function. Let's say you're cruising along on the freeway at 60 or 65 mph and someone ahead of you jams on their brakes (as happened to my grand

daughter). Your car may decelerate to zero in a fraction of a second. The phone watches for such a rapid speed change.

The noise generated in a crash is somewhat distinctive from other road sounds. The phone monitors the background sounds and constantly compares them to one or more sound patterns stored in its memory. The sound of the air bag deploying also may have its own distinct sound, although I could not confirm this. You may have glass-break sensors as part of your home's security system; they work the same way.

When the air bag deploys, there is a sudden increase in atmospheric pressure in the passenger compartment. The phone has a sensor that watches for such a pressure change. I'd assume it works best when all the windows are closed, but who drives any more at freeway speeds with their windows open? Obviously, it won't work when the convertible top is down.

Given that the factors involved in every car accident are varied and unique, crash detection has to factor all of these inputs to determine if there's been a crash — it's not just one overruling piece of information that triggers it. It takes input from all the sensors to tell the whole story. And, even then, it's still not perfect.

Apple worked extensively with crash labs to gather data and researched historical data from the Department of Transportation and the NHTSA (National Highway Traffic Safety Administration) to understand injury-likely crashes. This was to ensure that the feature would trigger only in a real accident and wouldn't go off unintentionally in some other situation. When a crash is detected, the phone will ask the victim if they're O.K. If they don't respond within several seconds, the phone then will place the call automatically.

But, the algorithm is not perfect. Despite Apple's extensive research and testing, false 911 calls occur frequently. This is true especially in areas near ski slopes or intense roller coasters, causing police or sheriff's deputies to go looking for crash scenes, wasting manpower and other resources. Some parks ask visitors to turn off the crash detection function. Some police departments agree with this. Others prefer you leave it on so you don't forget to turn it back on when leaving the park.

The reason for roller coasters and ski slopes setting of the phone bugged me and I think I figured it out. GPS isn't just determining latitude and longitude; it's also determining altitude. How many times have cars gone over the side of the road and down a steep ravine? I suspect the algorithm also watches for sudden altitude change and interprets it thusly.

To improve the crash detection function, Apple is studying false alarms and analyzing the situations that triggered them. Future versions of the algorithm may include things like geo-isolating, so the phones do not make 911 calls near a roller coaster or the slope portion of the ski resort.

Stay tuned for further developments and improvements.


