

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picture of it. Next one is in Greenland, Iceland and Northern Spain in 2026, if you missed this one or want to see it all again.

A friend pointed out recently that if I'm headed through Canada on my way to Oregon for GT-49, I probably will be going near the Northwest Angle, which is one of the geographic anomalies of the country's northern border. This is one of many peculiarities that resulted from people laying out borders before they had any specific knowledge of the geographic details they were using. In this case, the river that makes up one part of the border originates north of the latitudinal line that makes up another part of the border. Because of this there is a bump in the border between the US and Canada. Further complicating this, the routing of the border in this area results in a peninsula being in the US, but only connecting to land that is in Canada. This occurs elsewhere also, specifically Point Roberts, Washington, but I don't have current plans to go there. There is even a Northernmost marker in the Northwest Angle, similar to the Southernmost marker in Key West, Florida. As it is about 3 miles south and 9 miles east of the actual point, it is not quite in the same league for fidelity. The actual point and most other points in between do leave something to be desired in the way of accessibility, and that does count for something. And this accessibility is relative in a region that can only be accessed down a gravel/dirt road and involves crossing two international borders. But I have run out of corners in these contiguous United States and this is the only cardinal direction I have yet to get to. So that's something to add to the list of things to do in July on my way to Oregon.

Have you ever been several states away from home and stopped at the same place several times. Not because it's special, but just because it's predictable and you remember it being there. There's a Taco Bell off I-90 just into Illinois from Wisconsin that I think I've been to three different times. Undoubtedly there are better places to go, but this one I stumbled on once and I've ended up there a couple more times whenever I'm going through there. This isn't a recommendation. It's just an ordinary Taco Bell. I was thinking of this place the other day, although I really can't say why.

Other interesting places (actually interesting, as opposed to that one Taco Bell) I've stopped to eat on various road trips include a BBQ place outside Washington, DC. It was called the Aldie Country Store (in Aldie, VA). Saw a large smoker out front the first time I was through there during prep/scouting for Rallye To Reno. Stopped there again during R2R. Great ribs, and good sides also, as I recall. Kept meaning to go through there again, but I looked it up a couple years ago and they have changed and no longer do BBQ. Possibly closed entirely at this point.

Back when NAMGAR was meeting in Key West every year in April, a group from Virginia would drive down. I was part of that group quite a few times. We'd usually try to find interesting places to eat along I-95, as it's all too easy to just end up with two days down and two days back with little to remember. One of the first times on the way back we ended up at Parker's BBQ in Wilson, NC. That became a tradition to stop there just before getting back to Richmond, VA. Parker's is known for family style BBQ. It was about \$8 a head for pulled pork, fried chicken, Brunswick stew, cole slaw, green beans, hush puppies (two kinds), and tea or lemonade. Maybe some other sides were in there also. If you find yourself in Wilson, NC, by all means stop and give it a try.

In Jupiter, Florida there's a place on the inland waterway called Guanabanas. It's just a nice outdoor eatery with a view over the channel to some park. A place with a similar vibe is down in the Keys at MM20. It's called Mangrove Mama's and it's on Sugarloaf Key. A place to stop if you're headed down to KW or on your way back. Usually, we'd leave KW early in the morning, so it was most

Another place out west is in Oregon along the Columbia River. There are several scenic waterfalls along one particular section of the Columbia River with the tallest being Multnomah Falls (Mult-No-Ma). There's been a stone lodge there below the falls coming up on a hundred years. I stumbled across it almost 25 years ago. I was out for a weekend drive while on a two week business trip and figured I could drive to Mt Hood. This is before smart phones and I may have had a map, but I didn't pay much attention to it. Mt Hood is easily visible from numerous places around Portland, and I figured I could find it without much trouble. However, as soon as I got outside of town and dropped into the first valley, I never saw it again. I did have a good drive and ended up at Multnomah Falls Lodge for dinner. It was a great place to eat. I've been back a couple times and while it doesn't quite live up to my memory of that first weekend day, it's still been a nice place to eat. I'll have to give it another try this coming summer when I'm out there for GT-49.

My Pull Handle MGB

purchased my 1965 MGB on April 2, 2019, with an extra set of wire wheels and tires (at least it wasn't April Fool's Day). As near as I can figure, my MGB was manufactured in the spring of 1965. The last of the pull handle cars. Somewhere along its travels, it was merged with a 1968 MGB (engine, grille, bonnet, seats). The car has a good engine and a strong transmission.

The car's original color was BRG, but now it is at least 3 different colors of red. The car had 4 holes in the boot lid for a luggage rack. Thanks to Carole and Terry the holes are now filled with a luggage rack. Thinking of how to secure items to rack, I don't remember bungee cords in the 60's. So, I visited The Pudgy Pony Equine Thrift tack shop and found four 1 inch by five foot used leather straps. She sold them to me for \$ 2.00 each. which I was thrilled with.

The lights at the rear of the didn't work. So, after attempting to get them to work, a big failure, I had the car hauled to MG Automotive. Steve fixed the taillights, brake lights, flashers, map light also replaced the horns, fuse box, steering rack boots, transmission angle drive, and installed a working speedometer. To continue, refitted the fuel pump from the boot to the proper location. Replaced the hot rod steering wheel with an early 70's Momo Prototipo steering wheel (which I purchased for a six pack of beer. I felt I got the better of the deal, so I gave him two six packs of beer).

After Steve's work, I rebuilt the slave cylinder, rebuilt the driver's door opening









latch mechanism (to keep the door from flying open on right turns). Replaced window flex channels, door top seals, refitted padded dash rail. Replaced the red grille badge with the correct black grille badge, correct fuel cap, and added quick release seat belts, purchased from the same guy I got the Momo steering wheel from, for two beers. Replaced the amber side/flasher lenses with clear lenses.

Still have to refit the copper fuel line from the tank to the fuel pump, I have been doing a lot more thinking than doing on that task.

The car came with no door mirrors, but two bullet mirrors still in the boxes, were included. So, I located the mirror to the fender at the rear of the bonnet opening. I disliked that job so much; I don't think I ever put the passenger side mirror on. Work on the B would have been much easier if I didn't have to replace the P.O.'s (previous owners) work with correct MG parts. I'm looking forward to tooling along for many miles when the weather warms up.

MGB/C WHEELS

Fitted as standard equipment on MGB cars from 1962 to 1969, the painted disc wheel was painted in a silver colour -probably the BMC colour 'Aluminium' – and fitted with this simple hubcap design. The narrow-band whitewall tyres seen on this car are probably not the correct type for a pre-1963 car.



Painted wire wheels were available throughout the production period, this one being from a 1980 LE roadster. Until 1968 some cars had knockons, but thereafter all wire-wheeled cars featured this octagonal nut.



The 15in disc wheels fitted to the MGC were quite different from those on the MGB, with elongated instead of circular holes, and the characteristic beveled edge to the hubcap.




Alternatively the MGC could be fitted with 72-spoke wire wheels, either painted or chrome plated, as seen here. The knock-ons were fitted only during the first year of MGC production.

The V8 model had this style of composite wheel, with a cast alloy centre and a chrome-plated steel rim. This wheel was also found on the 1975 GT 'Jubilee' model, on which the bright parts were painted gold.



This cast alloy wheel is from a 1980 North American Limited Edition model, but the same wheel was also available as optional equipment on other cars in the 1979-80 period, and was found on most of the home market LE models built in 1980.
