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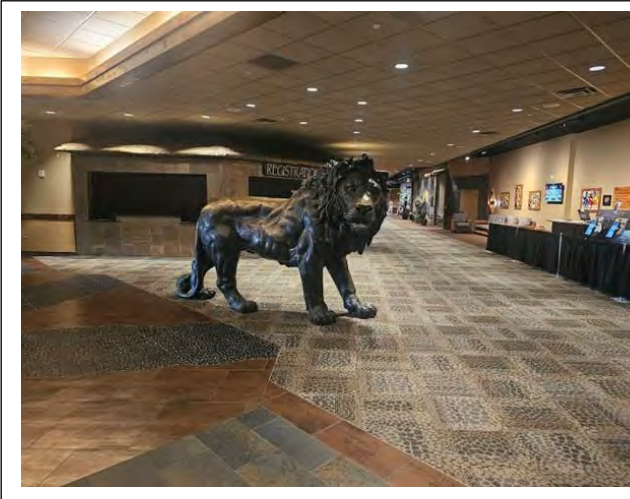
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upcoming meet as always. This will be the 7th 5-year get-together. With this show being centrally located, it is sure to be well attended.

Member Featured Car of the Month

MY 69MGB, and My MG Ownership Journey

So, my MG experiences go back to 1972, when I bought my first MGB. It was a beautiful car. BRG, tan interior, and I had the dealer (yes there were dealers back then in Jacksonville, Florida) add a roll bar. I thought that it made the car truly unique. That car, during moves, traveled from JAX to Jackson, MS, and then to Atlanta, GA. For fun, I actually drove it on business trips a few times even though I had a company car; and for a while it was my wife's daily driver. We loved that car and it was truly fun to drive. I eventually parted with it. Some years later. Some years later (1978 timeframe I think), I bought a red Midget. It was fun to drive, but it was a mess; a true shop queen. I only kept it for a year or two.

Some years passed and I got the urge again. In 2005, I bought a 1979 MGB. I don't think that it was BRG: I think that the other green color that my research suggested might have been Mallard green. Tan interior. I didn't drive it a lot but kept it until about 2020. It was somewhat a shop queen, and Steve Miller at MG Automotive was very familiar with it.

I really had the urge to acquire a BRG MGB of the same time period and color as my '72, chrome bumpers, dual carbs, etc. In my first internet search this '69 MGB popped up in Charlotte, NC. write-up suggested that it had been restored and was in pristine condition. I immediately contacted the owner and arranged a trip to see the car. I took cash with me (I'm such a negotiator...LOL). It was/is a stunning car. I bought it on the spot. The owner suggested I should drive it back to Dayton. No way was I going to drive all that way back to Dayton through the mountains, on the interstate with screaming truck traffic. Besides, I thought that I detected a slight issue in the right front when turning left during the test drive. I had it shipped. Steve Miller checked it out; and yep, wheel bearings. I was curious: I found out the name of the shop that restored the car, BJ & Sons in Star, NC. I reached out to them to find out what all that they had done during the car. Oh My Gosh; they





sent me a 5-page listing of everything that they did during a frame-off restoration, and over 500 pictures of the process. It was completed in 2015. I hope the pictures show just how beautiful that this car is (yeah, I'm proud). Side note: Ron Parks visited me to take a look at the car and take some more pictures. We discussed the color and concluded that it may not be BRG. I researched the list of work that occurred during restoration. It turns out that the color is Brooklands Green...but it's a beauty to me.



So to conclude, I wanted to share something that amused me after reading another owner's story in the Octagon few months back about how he got in and out of his "B." So, when I owned my '72, at age 25 or 26, Ha! getting in and out was no problem. Now at 78, with my '69, well it can be a hilarious event to witness. With the top up, forget it. I keep the top down mostly, and still have to crawl out, sometimes with hands on the garage floor...but I'll keep doing it!

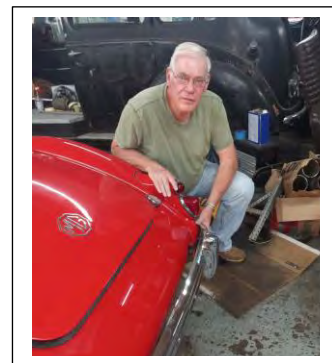

The history of automotive paint began with basic, air-drying varnishes applied by brush, which was a slow and time-consuming process. This changed dramatically in the 1920s with the development of faster-drying, sprayable [nitrocellulose lacquers](#) like DuPont's [Duco](#), which revolutionized production by reducing painting times from days to hours and offering more color options. Subsequent innovations included the introduction of tougher **alkyd enamels** in the 1930s and the development of the modern [basecoat/clearcoat system](#) in the 1970s, which applies a clear, protective layer over the colored pigment for improved durability and gloss. Today, automotive paints are primarily water-based with clearcoats and UV inhibitors for environmental and durability reasons.

Early years (c. 1900–1920s)

- **Hand-painted varnishes:** Early vehicles were painted with simple, varnish-like products that were brushed on, requiring multiple coats and taking as long as 40 days to complete.
- **Limited colors:** The color palette was very limited, often consisting of dark or black Japan black finishes, as the process was too slow for mass production.

The lacquer era (1920s–1950s)

- **Nitrocellulose lacquer:** An accidental discovery at DuPont led to the development of a fast-drying, sprayable nitrocellulose lacquer in the early 1920s.
- **Spray application:** The invention of the spray gun in 1924 and the use of lacquers dramatically sped up the painting process, making it feasible for mass production.
- **Wider color selection:** Lacquers allowed for a much greater variety of colors to be used.
- **Alkyd enamels:** The 1930s saw the introduction of alkyd enamels, which were more solvent-resistant and required fewer coats than lacquers, though they were prone to fading in sunlight.

The clearcoat revolution (1970s–present)

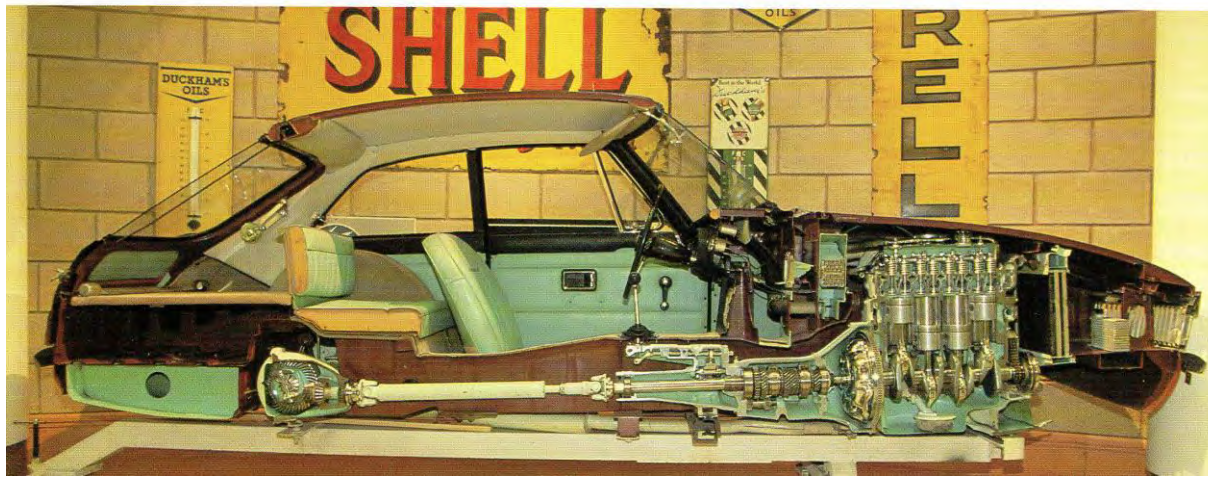
- **Basecoat/clearcoat:** In the 1970s, the basecoat/clearcoat system was developed, where the color pigment is sealed under a transparent, protective clear layer that includes UV inhibitors.
- **Improved durability:** This system significantly improved the paint's durability and resistance to the elements.
- **Universal adoption:** By the 1990s, the basecoat/clearcoat system was adopted by almost the entire automotive industry.
- **Shift to water-based paints:** Due to environmental regulations, lead and other heavy metals were removed, leading to a shift from solvent-based to water-based paints in recent decades.
