# My MG!! At E-Check?

First off, I'd like to thank Jasper Cemino for bringing to our attention that 'collector plate' cars need to be E-Checked.

I spoke with a supervisor at the Ohio EPA Headquarters in Columbus and found this to be a brand new law that they've created. (Yet another E-Check change?!)

Why? Because people who are trying to beat the E-Check system have bought 'collector plates' for any car that failed E-Check. These include such fine collector cars as Escorts, K-Cars, and those lovely Chevettes!!! If these people put as much effort into maintaining their cars as they did 'beating' the system, they would pass E-Check with no problem.

But anyway ... Now anyone who has a true collector car that is not yet twenty-five years old has to suffer. Our cars are mostly driven on clear days, when a smog threat is at its least! So I think it is wrong that they must be E-Checked . I personally have done performance modifications and they are quite costly. I don't want to undo them just to pass E-Check. I don't drive my car that much, just 732 miles this summer, and that is not enough to label it as a 'gross polluter!' (besides that I like the way it runs now!)

## MG Adventure to Albuquerque By Ron Parks

Wednesday October 1, 1997

My adventure began this morning with the top down. I stopped by the parents of my friend with whom I'll be staying in Albuquerque, for a cup of coffee. They live just down the road when they're not in Florida. After coffee and a couple of pictures I hit the road. I got as far as Route 127, the Eaton exit from I-70, when I said to myself, "This is silly. I'm freezing." The top went up.

I'm writing this journal entry by the light of a fluorescent lantern in my tent. I told Dave McCann I'd do an article, therefore I must make notes each day, lest I forget.

Today's driving was actually pretty uneventful. Had lunch at a roadside rest area somewhere in Indiana. Gassed up in Brazil Indiana and again in Rolla Missouri just east of this campground.

Stopped here at the Arlington RV Park about 30 miles east of Springfield MO to camp for the night. It only cost \$4 to pitch a tent. When I checked in, I remembered that I hadn't brought insect repellent. He had some and guess what. It cost \$4.25. More than the campsite. I barely got the tent up before dark. Called my wife Linda from the comfort of my tent using the cell phone I had borrowed from a friend at work. My plan was to only use the cell phone, with it's related high cost, for emergency car trouble calls, but it was late and dark, I didn't want to hunt a telephone. Those things are very convenient aren't they! I called Linda every night to let her know where I was and that I was Okav.

Had my supper in the tent. I'm eating out of the cooler on this trip. Do you get the idea this was a low budget trip? Pickle pimento loaf sandwich with

'collector cars' exempt from E-Check. (again!) She said that if our cars are collectable, we could possibly make that marque exempt! (she said to use documents, photos, etc. to prove it). Maybe a petition would help? (if your car is twenty-five years old or older, it is already exempt!) But for now, some of us have to deal with E-Check.

E-Check was created because air quality readings in the Miami Valley (13 counties total) were not safe! The concern is a photochemical smog made up primarily of hydrocarbons and oxides of nitrogen produced by automobiles and factories. The factories in these counties are faced with tougher pollution standards than ever before, and they are extremely expensive. But the people who drive cars are forced to properly maintain their cars and this is expensive also! But remember, E-Check tests to see if your car is putting out close to the same exhaust emissions that it did when it was new, so if your car does fail that means something is wrong. Although sometimes we alter tuning for performance, that unfortunatly also increases exhaust emissions and can make your car fail E-Check.

If your car fails, it is not that bad to straighten out. The EPA has set a limit of \$300, and if you spend that amount you qualify for a two year waiver. There is no limit to waivers, so you are only required to spend \$300 every two years. There is also a waiver if you spend \$200 and show a 30% improvement in emissions. Diagnostic and labor costs do count, unless you do it yourself.

If your car fails, there is no charge for the E-Check test the first and second times only. If you need a third test and fail again, you must pay the \$19.50 fee.

Another concern at our last meeting was vehicle damage. I've been told that E-Check is responsible for your car during testing. I've also been told the manager will drive your car if you insist. (1980 and older cars do only the 'idle' and 'loaded' tests, not the full test) If your plates expire before you can pass the test, you can get up to two thirty day tags, that gives you time to straighten out your car.

#### E-Check tips:

- Be sure to have fresh oil in the engine, old oil becomes contaminated with hydrocarbons and can negativly affect your

test.

- Be sure engine is running at normal operating temperature. This is important for proper combustion. A cold engine produces excessive hydrocarbons and an engine which is running too hot can produce excessive oxides of nitrogen.

- Check all basic tune-up parts

- Set timing and carburettor mixtures by the service manual specifications.

- Run high octane fuel.

that purpose. I'm carrying extra drinking water for myself too. I'll be driving in the high desert soon you know.

I suppose this would be a good time to outline my preparations for the trip:

One day on my lunch hour, Bill Hammond went with me to Auto Zone to help me select a spare fuel pump and related hoses an clamps. For \$27.50 I have a backup fuel pump with a lifetime guarantee. I believe I have everything I need to change it on the road should that become necessary. I'll duct tape the new fuel pump to the old one if I have to. Yes, by all means, I do have duct tape with me.

I went down to Randy Balogh's (Strictly British) and he checked over my brakes. I've been losing a little brake fluid, but we didn't locate a leak. I bought some brake fluid and a new rearview mirror from him. My old one was cracked and loose. He replaced a connector on my left backup light and helped me check all the lights. He also checked over some suspension noises I'd noticed since my suspension rebuild. Everything seemed fine. The brake fluid was still up when I checked it this evening. It's a very slow leak and I didn't use the brakes much today.

I stopped by MG Automotive on my way home from work yesterday evening to pickup an air pump belt and a fan belt. I'm carrying jumper cables, spare ignition parts, spare hoses, two

tire pumps (one electric, one hand pump), two jacks, one jack stand, tools and three quarts of Castrol 20W50. I changed the oil Monday evening, but not the filter. Only had 1,500 miles on that oil change and decided to change the filter after the trip. I think I'm as well prepared as I can be?

I'm going to shower in the morning.

# Minutes

The group agreed to discuss options later in the meeting. Matt Schneider then thanked last year's officers for their work, and introduced the new officers. The minutes from the September meeting were approved unread since no one could find them. The Treasurer's report from Bill Hammond indicated a staring balance of \$509.22, income of \$264.50, expenses of \$140.17 for a closing balance of \$633.55.

The membership report from Linda Wolfe welcomed new member Garth Williams from Oakwood. Williams owns a 1965 MGB and joined as a result of attending British Car Day '97.

Octagon News editor Dave McCann asked for articles and cars of the month, and reminded all that the deadline for publication is the first Wednesday of the month. You're reading it right here, in the Octagon News.

A beer break was called at 8:30 pm and Ron Parks had a slide show from his recent trip to Albuquerque. Parks drove his "B" out and back with no problems, to attend the annual Balloon rally. The meeting reconvened at about 8:55 pm.

Skip Peterson presented a report on the BCD '98 meeting held October 8 at Marion's. New general chairman Ron Wynne was not present at the meeting, however, the core group in attendance agreed to accept the financial statement which showed a closing profit of about \$2700. \$1700 was agreed

to be left in the checking account and each club is to receive a check for \$1000 for their share of the profit. All committee chairs agreed to stay on for one more year and no date was set for another meeting. Peterson will work with Ron Wynne regarding the next planning meeting.

The Wolfe's reported on the fall color tour held the previous Sunday, with 19 cars in caravan. They drove to Caesars Creek and on to Valley Vineyards for a late afternoon dinner.
