Fall Tour Plans

Give your MG the once over--change the oil if it's time, tighten the fan belt, check the air in the tires, etc. and make your reservations; we're going to Auburn Indiana on our Fall tour. Our plan is to drive to Auburn Indiana on Saturday morning October 1st, have lunch at the Auburn House and then go visit the Auburn/Cord/ Duesenberg museum in the afternoon. After having driven to Auburn that morning and visiting the museum in the afternoon, the last thing we probably want to do is drive somewhere for dinner. So, we will check in to the Auburn Inn and have a nice evening dinner catered, complete with a cash bar. The cost of dinner is \$10 per person and includes taxes and setup charges. After having breakfast at our leisure on Sunday morning, we'll do some local touring and then those who may want to head home early, may do so. Or, you may choose to visit the National Automotive & Truck Museum, which is located adjacent to the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Museum; and then depart for home after lunch.

Reservations:

We have a block of rooms set aside for us at the Auburn Inn at the special group rate of \$85 plus tax for a total of \$94.35. Breakfast is included and is a step above your typical continental breakfast. It includes waffles, eggs, French toast, etc. These rooms will be held for us until Friday September 23rd. If, as you're reading this, it is already past September 23rd, this doesn't necessarily mean you won't be able to reserve a room. It merely means that the remaining rooms in the block are no longer being held for our group. You may still be able to get a reservation at the special group rate. This is a Best Western Motel and is very nice. There is a nice lobby area with stuffed chairs, porches with rocking chairs, (for us old folks) and a meeting room where we will have our catered dinner. You may choose to take a look at the Auburn Inn online, by visiting their website: www.auburninn.com. You must call 1-800-95FOCUS (1-800-953-6287) to reserve your room and guarantee with your credit card. Tell them you want to reserve one of the rooms set aside for the MG Car Club for Saturday October 1, 2005. The Auburn Inn's policy is to charge your credit card \$50 for a deposit at the time you make your reservation. This \$50

deposit will be applied to your room charge when you check out. The Auburn Inn's cancellation policy is 7 days prior to check-in.

The Plan:

We will meet in the parking lot at Meijer's in Englewood on Route 48 at 8:15am on Saturday October 1, 2005. Be on time. We need to leave promptly at 8:30am. We will travel West on I-70, North on SR 49, North on US 127, West on US 30, North on I-469 and North on I-69 to Exit 129 (Auburn). Most of the trip will be on two lane highways where we'll cruise at 55 mph. Once we hit the divided highway from US 30 onward, we'll probably cruise between 60 - 65 mph. Maps and driving directions will be provided along with information about attractions in Auburn.

NAMGBR in Olympia, WA, with The Looft's: An Outsiders View (or, What Really Happened)

Washington State for a North America MGB Register meet, I never realized what an adventure it would be. Here are some numbers to start you out. We drove 3175 miles on our way out to Washington and 2586 miles on our way back. That gives us a total of 5761 miles in a two week period. In the words of Carole Looft; "It feels like all we have done for two weeks is fill the cars up with gas."

Pre-NAMGBR, I never realized the true beauty of an MG but after this trip I think I have a good idea. We left the morning of June 30th at 6:20am. Terry drove Carole's 78 B and Ryan drove his 77 B. I woke up around Cincinnati to Terry on the radio saying, "Well, we've made it to Cincinnati with no problems yet." Then, Ryan's car started backfiring. Two rest stops later we figured out that his carburetor was running too lean and he had a vacuum seal that Terry fixed. We accomplished 740 miles in our first day (and called that pushing it) and ended up in Albert Lea, Minnesota, for the night.

The next day we got an early start on the road and visited the Corn Palace in Mitchell, South Dakota. It was neat to see corn nailed on the walls of a building, but what was even more exciting was that the bar across the street has Midget Wrestling on Sunday night! Our next stop was at Wall Drug in Wall, SD (imagine Ceasar's Creek Flea Market on steroids). It was in Wall where Terry found a radiator leak in Carol's car. Thanks to the local NAPA auto parts we were about to get back on the road in no time. Following I-90 West, we were able to visit Mt. Rushmore and Sturgis before we found a hotel for the night. Thankfully, we reached the hotel

about five minutes after Carole's alternator failed and were able to roll into the Howard Johnson in Spearfish, SD, safely.

Day three began with Terry replacing Carole's alternator, and after that we had no problems for the rest of the day. We visited Devils Tower in Wyoming and then proceeded to wind through the Rocky Mountains on our way to our next destination. We ended up getting up to an altitude a little over 9000ft. and it was beautiful up there. The MGs did not seem to appreciate it as much as I did but we all made it through. We arrived in Cody, Wyoming, just in time for church, a cowboy bar, some butt crack, and a haunted restaurant. The most exciting thing about this adventure was that we discovered Moose Drool - a beer brewed in Missoula, Montana.

We began day four early Sunday morning and were all excited to see Yellowstone National Park. The first few miles into the park were winding around rocky cliffs (that were under construction) with a slew of motor homes and vans. Once we leveled out the road outlined the beautiful Yellowstone Lake. We started to see buffalo off in the distance. As Ryan and I came over a ridge we noticed that two buffalo were in our lane and coming straight towards us. Ryan stopped, hoping that they would just walk off the road, but they continued to come closer and closer. Finally, Ryan pulled the car into the left lane and as the buffalo passed I took pictures and realized that the buffalo were bigger than the MG! Carole and Terry were behind us and simply went around the animals as well. We drove a little slower after this encounter and enjoyed the rest of the park. We had lunch in Grand Teton NP and then headed north to see Old Faithful. Old Faithful turned out to be a sea of mini vans. Our mile walk from the parking lot to the geyser showed us that traffic on the way out was going to be hot and miserable (for Ryan and me because we had no air conditioning). We waited about twenty minutes and Mr. Faithful spit out a little water and then about eight minutes later he finally blew. Halfway through the Loofts and I cut through the crowd in hopes of missing the mini van parade out of the park. We drove into Helena, Montana, but before we could settle in we stopped into the local Wal-Mart to find some Moose Drool, but unfortunately they were out.

Day five began with a hunt for Moose Drool in Helena, Montana, and two grocery stores later all we came out with was a six pack. We gave up the search in Helena to get started on our journey toward Glacier NP. We turned off the major highway in Cut Bank, Montana to take the two lane road west towards the entrance to The-Road-To-The-Sun that takes you through Glacier, but before venturing on we had to stop at a grocery store to see if they might have some Moose Drool. As we pulled in, a passerby shouted "Is that a Triumph?" and Terry replied, "No, it's an MG." The stranger turned his car around the parking lot and as he passed by the second time he vengefully said, "Triumphs are better." Little did I know, those words were fight'n words. Terry walked quickly towards the mans car, but the man knew what he had just said and so he drove to the other end of the parking lot like the scared Triumph lover he was. Three *cases* of Moose Drool later we were on our way.

We stopped one more time for gas and then headed into Glacier. The-Road-To-The-Sun was not allowed to have any kind of camper or motor home on it and there were limits as to how long the vehicle could be. Terry and Carole made it with the trailer by six inches. We would have been very upset if we had to turn around. Glacier National Park has to be one of the most beautiful places I have ever seen. Out of all the places we had seen within the past few days this was the icing on the cake. It was majestic with its white peaks jutting out of scenic valleys and winding rivers. The water falls were everywhere. At one point we were driving with a three hundred foot cliff on one side and a water fall coming down the other side. I even saw a Hispanic gentleman taking a shower with one hand still on the passenger side door of his truck. There are no words to describe the beauty we saw up there and the pictures do it no justice. We stopped for buffalo burgers before we left the park and headed on our way to Missoula, Montana.

We left Missoula on day six \$60 richer from the truck stop casino we visited the evening before. We were on the road and our next stop would be Seattle, Washington. Or our next stop would be St. Regis and Superior, Montana, for some Moose Drool memorabilia. When we stopped for lunch a few hours later Carole's car was running hot. Fifteen miles down the road we pulled over because now it was running too hot so Terry added some water. Two miles later we pulled over again. Terry could not figure out why we were overheating so he removed the thermostat to see if that would help. We were 45 miles east of Seattle when Carole's overdrive went out so Terry added oil to fix it. We finally arrived in Seattle around six o'clock. We got settled into the hotel, went for drinks in a nearby pub, and then took a bus down to the wharf for dinner.

Wednesday, July 6th (day 7) began at about 10am. We all took the morning to sleep in and relax. Terry and Carole were going to pick up another MGB in Olympia and Ryan and I were on our way to see the Pacific Ocean. The parking lot for the beach was the beach. Ryan actually got to park his car in the sand and we took lots of pictures. I was excited to get in the water but the temperature was a little uncomfortable and the fact that it was cloudy and rainy did not help. We got to Olympia later on in the afternoon. After dinner we went to the hospitality room to drink some Fat Tire and enjoy the company of many of the local MG club members while Terry changed the oil in all three cars.

Thursday, day 8, began with the car drive to Mt. St. Helens. There were 26 MGs that went. Just before the stop for lunch Ryan's clutch fluid started running low and we had to make an emergency stop to add more fluid. Thanks again to NAPA Auto Parts. We returned just in time for dinner and some more drinks at the hospitality room while Terry cleaned the carburetors on the new car and gave it some new spark plugs.

Friday was the first day of the trip where I refused to get into the MG. We had spent the past eight days in the MG with its lightly padded seats and arm rests, little to no foot room, no air conditioning, and non-retractable seats. I ate breakfast at the hotel, did laundry, and I took a two hour nap through lunch. Terry and Carole attended a tech meeting where they learned that it is bad to take the thermostat out, water runs cooler than antifreeze, Carole's car was not overheating, and her temperature and gas gauges were not reading correctly. We had a Salmon BBQ at a local Indian reservation and came back to wash the car because this was the first time it had stopped raining that day. Afterwards Ryan and I headed to the hospitality room to, yet again, drink some more beer and hang out with the Cincinnati crowd while Terry put the thermostat back in Carole's car, added water, and wired in a separate temperature gauge.
